

What are the roots of today's political rage?



Democracy is facing new challenges in today's society from radical and extremist movements such as identity politics, QAnon, white nationalism and others.

Celebrated essayist and novelist Mary Eberstadt traces these movements to their common denominator, which she argues lies in the collapse of family and faith.

She proposes that part of the proper political response to these challenges requires a new engagement with the evidence of the role family and religion play in giving people a sense of belonging and hope, and in helping them reject the siren songs of extremism.

As Panula Chair in Christian Culture at the Catholic Information Center and a senior research fellow at the Faith and Reason Institute, Mary Eberstadt draws on the situation in the United States, where she lives and works, to offer insights on Australian politics.
